Zeeko Seminar – Safety on the internet

On March 12th, an expert in the area of internet safety arrived at our school to carry out sessions with 3rd, 4th, 5th and 6th class. While Lisa acknowledged that in comparison to some schools around the country Piercestown NS did not stand our alarmingly, she *was concerned* about the number of children at primary age level accessing devices. While we acknowledge that these are indeed parental decisions, from the school perspective of teaching internet safety, when children are accessing games and apps that are illegal for their age, it makes our teaching difficult around these areas. Teachers work to the best of their ability to inform and educate the children about internet safety and in particular cyberbullying through SPHE however, ultimately it is the responsibility of parents as the primary educators to help us, the school, in this area. We hope that by working with you the parents as a team, that going forward our children will be able to make the correct decisions, and exhibit resilience in what can only be described as challenging circumstances. This is something that needs to be monitored carefully and constantly and conversations need to take place to ensure the safety of our young children as they grow up in an ever changing and ever challenging society.

Chess Presentation

Congratulations to the winners of our chess tournament 2023-2024. We were delighted to welcome chess guru and former principal Mr. Eamonn Barrett back into the building yesterday to present our chess awards. In total over 400 games had been played throughout the tournament. Prior to the presentation we also received the results of the recent Ficheall tournament with both our Masters team, 'The Rookies' and our Budding Masters 'The Gallant Knights' coming top of their leader boards. School Self Evaluation update- what next?!

Under circular 0056/2022 schools engage in School self-evaluation over a cycle of up to three years. As per our last newsletter, as a staff we have identified 'Gaeilge' / Irish as our area in need of improvement. With school closures during covid in recent years, remote learning and prioritising of literacy and numeracy upon re-opening, as a staff we feel this area now needs our attention. As part of SNAG 2024, all children completed a survey on the iPads on the last day of 'Seachtain na Gaeilge' and as a staff we will use this evidence. Many thanks to all the parents who completed our google doc parental survey. This is invaluable information. As we are in the gathering evidence phase, we are hugely grateful for the data returned. We hope to take a focus group of pupils after Easter for a further interview and then take all our evidence and move to phase 3 when, as a staff, we hope to 'analyse the evidence and make judgements'. If you didn't complete the survey, there is still time, and we would be very grateful.

Handwriting Competition

Another area prioritised for improvement this term, was that of handwriting. Under the direction of Ms. Caldicott a massive effort in handwriting was put in by all classes from 1st to 6th class. The competition deadline was in time for the long weekend in March and the results are in. Our last day of term two saw the presentations being made. Overall, it must be said that the standard of handwriting improved across ALL classes. We were delighted to be supported and sponsored by Green Tech HQ. Green Tech are Ireland's first sustainable innovation hub in Enniscorthy.
